Man's Search for Meaning Discussion Questions

Part One: Experiences in a Concentration Camp

In what ways can leaders help their teams find personal meaning in their work, especially during difficult times? How does Frankl's concept of finding meaning in suffering apply to leadership challenges?

Frankl thought that there are three possible sources for meaning in life: in work (doing something significant), in love (caring for another person), and in courage during difficult times. Suffering in and of itself is meaningless; we give our suffering meaning by the way in which we respond to it. Talk about how this relates to your own thoughts on suffering.

Part Two: Logotherapy in a Nutshell

What role does personal responsibility play in effective leadership? How might a leader apply Frankl's idea of "striving for a worthy goal" to create a more engaged and purpose-driven workplace?

Overall Reflections on the Book:

Can you think of a situation where a leader's sense of meaning, or purpose significantly impacted their team's performance or morale?
